Celebrating ABLE Volunteers


To honor and celebrate our volunteers during International Volunteer Month, this newsletter is dedicated to the amazing group of people who make a difference in the lives of blind and print disabled individuals every day. ABLE started in 1965 with a strong team of volunteers and is *still* going strong because of the dedicated hearts and hands of these extraordinary individuals. Volunteers work anywhere from four to thirty hours a week, putting materials into audio, braille or tactile formats. In 2022, our volunteers gave a total of 9,256 hours of dedicated service. Have you ever wondered what goes on behind the scenes at ABLE? Read on!

Audio

There are three volunteer roles in the audio department: at-home reader, inoffice narrator and at-home audio reviewer. At-home readers use their own computer and a microphone to read individual requests for print materials to be transcribed into audio. Such requests might be for a manual, or a motivational, spiritual or self-help book. In-office narrators read a book in the ABLE Sound Center, assigned to them by a staff member. These volunteers first must read the book at home to become familiar with it, its characters, and any unusual words. They then come to the ABLE Sound Center to read into a microphone in one of our sound booths while a member of our staff edits their work on the spot.

At-home audio reviewers receive a thumb drive and hard copy of the book to review. They read the book alongside listening to the recording of the book in order to note any changes that need to be made. Any corrections needed are then made by an audio narrator and a member of our audio staff.

Our audio volunteers gave 2,122 hours in 2022. This team produced seventy books for the Wisconsin Talking Book and Braille Library. For the second year in a row, books recorded in our studio circulated close to 12,000 times. More than 5,200 individuals in Wisconsin, and more than 310,000 individuals throughout the whole country, are eligible to receive these books.

Books that circulated include two children's books featuring blind protagonists: *Two Canes on the Tundra* and *Blooming Besties* by Mary Tellefson. These books, which circulated 547 times in the final quarter of 2022, provide blind children with a protagonist they can relate to. Our team also recorded twenty-eight periodicals and newsletters, seven organizational requests including Summerfest, Irish Fest and State Fair schedules, and ten individual requests.



Braille

Our braille process starts with volunteers using Optical Character Recognition software to convert the image of print into editable text in a Microsoft Word document. The creation of the Word document

introduces occasional errors of substitution, omission or reading order, which then need to be fixed. Volunteers use OCR software to edit the Word document to match the original text.

Next a certified braille transcriber works on the document to create a formatted braille file. These files are submitted to our Nemeth mathematics braille staff person, our literary braille staff person, or a volunteer for proofing.

The end product is embossed on our braille embosser, then stapled or bound into a book.

Our braille and tactile team gave over 7,000 hours of time and talent in 2022. That year alone ABLE produced 16,546 pages of braille learning materials, including 2,540 tactile diagrams. The materials included elementary and high school mathematics, reading curriculum and scholastic magazines, and over 300 braille books given out free of charge with a print copy for family members. Our volunteers also worked on many other materials including Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra and Marcus Performing Arts Center programs, braille election ballots and many other projects for the Milwaukee community and beyond. Total pages circulated in 2022: 68,000.
