Blasting off with Braille Games

The 2023 Braille Games on May 11th was an amazing success. Nearly thirty children from Milwaukee Public Schools and surrounding school districts from as far away as Oshkosh had a blast at the games this year.

Focusing on astronomy, the sky was the limit! Children were fascinated by the tactiles of the moon, supplied by NASA. Everybody was able to blast off a replica of a rocket! Braille was very much a part of the day as children made words with braille blocks, read about the moon, wrote a story about exploring their own secret planet and played a board game, Race to the Moon. ABLE collaborated with the Milwaukee Public Museum, Vision Forward and the Wisconsin Talking Book and Braille Library, with blind adult mentors lent to Braille Games by Beyond Vision, to put on Braille Games. This is an annual event that provides activities emphasizing the importance and relevance of braille for blind children. We were grateful to be again at the Milwaukee Public Museum.



Braille Books for Children

We are so grateful to the Forest County Potawatomi Foundation for supporting our book project to put 100 braille and print copies of the book, *Tenacious: Fifteen Adventures Alongside Disabled Athletes*, into the hands of braille readers throughout Wisconsin.

In *Tenacious* you will meet fifteen remarkable athletes who use adaptive equipment in this beautiful and truth-telling picture book. A downhill skier whose blindness has sharpened her communication skills. An adaptive surfer who shreds waves while sitting down. A young man who excels at wheelchair motocross, but struggles with math. *Tenacious* tells their stories and more, revealing the daily joys and challenges of life as disabled athletes.

Author Patty Cisneros Prevo is a two-time Paralympic gold medalist, and proud mom and partner. She also works as the University of Wisconsin Health

Program Manager of DEI. Patty experienced a spinal cord injury in college but went on to compete in wheelchair basketball at the Paralympic Games.

At ABLE, this book project continues an initiative we started in 2018 to get more braille books into the hands of blind children throughout Wisconsin. This book has also been read in our state-of-the-art Sound Center by volunteer reader, Tiffany Tinsley. Because of the partnership with the Wisconsin Talking Book and Braille Library, the audio version of this book will be made available to over 310,000 individuals throughout the whole country.

Amy says, "After seeing the 1951 movie *Bright Victory* in which a soldier is wounded in WWII, loses his vision, and undergoes O&M (orientation and mobility) and braille education, I was moved to find a position working with blind and visually impaired individuals. This eventually led me to becoming a one-to-one instructional assistant, transcribing many tactiles for a few different blind and visually impaired students for about five years. I am very happy to now be a part of the wonderful team at ABLE!

"I live on a 35 acre farm in Waterford with an elderly family member who is my best friend. We have one horse, Rocky, five indoor cats, and feed a few hungry ferals who live outside in our numerous buildings. I love listening to music, watching old Hollywood
